**Col Robert C. Owen** (BA, MA, UCLA; MA, PhD, Duke University) is the dean of the School of Advanced Airpower Studies, Maxwell AFB, Alabama. His previous assignments have included professor of air power studies at the School of Advanced Airpower Studies; chief, Joint Doctrine Branch, Doctrine Division, Headquarters USAF, Pentagon, Washington, D.C.; executive officer and instructor pilot, 34th Tactical Air Lift Training Group, Little Rock AFB, Arkansas; and assistant professor of history, US Air Force Academy. Colonel Owen has published articles in such periodicals as *Airpower Journal* and *Comparative Strategy*, among others.



**Maj Gen I. B. Holley Jr.**, USAFR, Retired (BA, Amherst; MA and PhD, Yale), is professor emeritus of history at Duke University. He has been a visiting professor at the National Defense University and the US Military Academy. Tritten** (BA, American University; MA, Florida State University; MA and PhD, University of Southern California) is exercise and training director (plans); Joint Training, Analysis, and Simulation Center; US Atlantic Command. He previously served as academic advisor to the commander, Naval Doctrine Command; chairman and associate professor, National Security Affairs, Naval Postgraduate School; and assistant director, Net Assessment, Office of the Secretary of Defense. A retired naval aviator (carrier based), Dr. Tritten is the author of three books and numerous journal articles.



**Maj YuLin G. Whitehead** (USAFA; MA, Webster University) is an intelligence officer assigned as deputy commander, 607th Air Intelligence Group, Osan AB, Korea. Previous assignments include chief of the wing operations intelligence branch for the 354th Tac-




