Col Alan J. Parrington (BS, Colorado State University; MA, University of Alabama) is USAir attaché to the Court of St. James, London, England. He is an F-4/F-15 command pilot who previously served as the Space Command-sponsored research fellow at Air University's Center for Aerospace Doctrine, Research, and Education, and as the deputy for eign policy advisor to USCINCPAC. Colonel Parrington has published two articles on space warfare in *Airpower Journal*. He is a graduate of Air Command and Staff College and Air War College.



Dr. Mark R. Grandstaff (BS, Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University; MA, Brigham Young University; PhD, University of Wisconsin-Madison) is an assistant professor of American history at Brigham Young University and a Reserve major assigned as a historian to the Air Force Historical Research Agency at Maxwell AFB, Alabama. While on active duty, he served as a missile combat crew commander in the 564th Missile Squadron at Malmstrom AFB, Montana; as a member of the Air Force historian's staff in Washington, D.C.; and as the AFOTC commandant of cadets at the University of California, Berkeley. He is an expert on the confluence between the military and society and has published extensively in that field. His most recent book, *Foundation of the Force: Air Force Enlisted Policy, 1907-1956*, is a pathbreaking look into the Air Force's enlisted experience as well as a guide for future personnel-policy actions. He is currently working on a monograph that examines the origins of Air University and Air Force officer professionalism.



Dr. Richard G. Davis (BA, University of Virginia; MA, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill; PhD, George Washington University) is a senior historian with the Air Force History Support Office, Bolling AFB, Washington, D.C. Before joining the Air Force history program, he worked as an archivist at the National Archives. The author of several articles and books, he wrote *Carl A. Spaatz and the Air War in Europe, 1940-1945*, winner of the Aviation/Space Writers' Association Award of Excellence in non fiction for 1994. Dr. Davis is currently editing the USAF Desert Shield/Storm Oral History Project and has begun work on *The USAF in Korea: Policy and Direction*, a new volume in the USAF Korean War Series.



Maj Marc K. Dippold (BS, Northern Arizona University; MBA, University of Arizona) is currently flying with the 8th Fighter Wing at Kunsan Air Base, South Korea. He previously served as chief of the NATO Branch, Plans and Operations, Headquarters USAF; as assistant operations officer, F-16 instructor, and standardization/evaluation pilot, 526th Fighter Squadron, Ramstein AB, Germany; and flight commander, A-10 instructor, and standardization/evaluation pilot, 358th Tactical Fighter Training Squadron, Davis-Monthan AFB, Arizona. Major Dippold is a graduate of Squadron Officer School and a distinguished graduate of Air Command and Staff College.



Timothy L. Thomas (BS, USMA; MA, University of Southern California) is an analyst at the Foreign Military Studies Office at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. In 1993 Mr. Thomas retired as a lieutenant colonel from the Army, where he served as a foreign area officer, specializing in Soviet/Russian studies. His military assignments include serving as the director of Soviet studies at the United States Army Russian Institute in Garmisch, Germany; as an inspector of Soviet tactical operations under the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe; and as a Brigade S-2 and company commander in the 82d Airborne Division. He has done extensive research on peacekeeping, information war, and political-military affairs and has numerous publications in these areas. Mr. Thomas is the assistant editor of the journal *European Security*, an adjunct professor at the Army's Eurasian Institute, and a member of the Russian Academy of International Information and the Academy of Natural Sciences.



Col Charles M. Westenhoff (BS, USMA) is chief, Commander's Action Group, USAF Air Warfare Center, Nellis AFB, Nevada. A command pilot with over twenty-five hundred hours in the A-37, O-2, and T-39, Colonel Westenhoff has written numerous articles in *Airpower Journal*, *Military Review*, and *Joint Force Quarterly* and is the author of the book *Military Air Power* (Air University Press, 1990).
